

National Youth Leader Training



National Youth Leader Training (NYLT) is an intensive, sevenday outdoor training experience for young men and women in support of the Scoutmaster's responsibility for the training of troop youth leaders. The course is conducted by the Heart of America Council Training Committee using the Junior

Leader Training Conference outline, approved by the Boy Scout Division of the Boy Scouts of America.

The purpose of NYLT is to give participants the confidence and knowledge to run the troop program; to give participants a basic knowledge of the eleven skills of leadership and help them relate these skills to their troop responsibilities; to give participants the opportunity to share ideas and experiences with Scouts from other troops; to create an atmosphere where Scouts will experience Scouting at it's best; to enhance the relationship between the participant and his Scoutmaster; and TO HAVE FUN!

Each conference participant must be enrolled in a Venturing Crew or a Boy Scout Troop and be at least a First Class Scout, 13 years old and currently filling a leadership position in the unit or likely to assume one soon. They must also be proficient in basic Scouting skills.

The conference is intended to strengthen the relationship between the junior leader and his Scoutmaster. The Scoutmaster or one of his assistants is expected to attend the final day's leadership commitment conference.

There will be two courses running simultaneously; one with a starting date of Sunday, May 31, 2015 and ending Friday, June 5, 2015; and the other course with a starting date of Monday, June 1, 2015 and ending June 26, 2015. NYLT will be held at the Theodore Naish Scout Reservation.

What Did YOU Learn From the March CubCast?

The launch of the new Cub Scout program scheduled for June 1st is fast approaching.

Feeling less than prepared? The CubCast team hears you. That's why in the March 2015 edition, the hosts and their guests discuss how Cubmasters and



den leaders can get ready for the new Cub Scout program.

Ken King is a volunteer from the Three Fires Council in St. Charles, Ill., and was a member of the task force that conceived and designed the new Cub Scout program materials that will be released in May and become active on June 1, 2015.

On the March 2015 CubCast (which is about 14 minutes long), King discusses many items regarding the new Cub Scout program. Here are seven items you will learn from this CubCast:

7. The program materials debut May 1.

That'll give you plenty of time to check out the actual materials you'll use with your Cub Scouts. "Pick up a copy of the youth handbook that you'll be working with and the den leader guide that you'll need and spend some time reviewing," King says, "because the den leader guide will map out how to deliver a den meeting in great detail."

6. The new Cub Scout program will cost the same (or maybe less).

"The number of adventure loops required is approximately the same as the number of academic and sports loops that are earned by boys right now," King says. "The new program won't be appreciably different, and some calculations suggest it will be a little bit less than what it is right now."

5. You won't need a ton of extra materials.

You "don't need to buy additional resources — things like the Group Meeting Sparklers, the Cub Scout Songbook, (and) the How-to Book of Cub Scouting," King says. "They're all still available as extra resource materials, but everything is contained in one single den leader guide."

4. Overall pack meeting structure will look the same.

You'll "be familiar with it," King says. You've "had experience with pack meetings but, some things we've developed to help them be more successful is we have a team that's putting together new pack meeting plans." So it's the same, only a lot better.

3. There are more opportunities for immediate recognition.

Cub Scout-age boys love instant recognition. That's been a standard at den meetings, and now it's more true at pack meetings, too.

"There's also more opportunities for recognition during pack meetings," King says, "depending on how the pack wants to organize that, boys can be recognized consistently, which will encourage them to be involved in the pack meetings and bring their families in to celebrate their successes."

2. The transition from old to new is actually really easy.

"Starting on June 1, if you're a new Tiger, a Wolf, Bear, or starting the Webelos program, just use the new program materials that are in the handbooks and materials," King says. "They're designed to make it easy to use, and when they finish their current level of program, they can just step into the next step without any problem."

1. Boys working on Arrow of Light can use new or old.

"Boys that'll be working on their Arrow of Light" later this year have two choices, King says. "They can keep using the current program, or they have the additional option that they can apply some of their previously earned Webelos-level recognitions and their activity badges; some of those can be used for advancement in the new system."

Comments From Our District Chairman



Greetings, North Star!

Not long ago, it seemed as is if winter would never end. Now Easter is behind us, spring is here for us to enjoy and can you believe it, summer is a few short weeks away!

Summer is an important time for our Scouting program in

many ways. There are activities for all our units including Day Camp for cubs and Summer Camp for scouts. Planning for these started last fall with camp draws and leader assignments. But, now is the time to make sure that all Scouts have the opportunity to attend. We want to make sure that as many Scouts as possible participate in these activities - because they are such an important part of Scouting.

Now is also the time to plan additional activities for your units during the summer. We all know how busy it is with family activities, summer sports, school activities, and everything else that goes on. It is too easy to let our scouting programs "take a break" after day or summer camp with the intention of regrouping in the fall, but if we do our scouts can lose interest. When that happens membership and retention suffer. Spring recruiting programs are designed to offer our activities to those who missed fall sign-ups and want to participate during the summer, but it is up to us as leaders to see that the summer months are active and busy for all scouts, new and old.

Summer is also a good time for planning, particularly for scouts. A summer campout is a perfect time to let the scouts design their program for next year. Leaders need to know what the scouts like, and sometimes the scouts need some direction in choosing activities that fill advancement

needs as well as being fun. Planning needs broad participation and all the distractions of summer can make it hard to focus on scouting. By getting your units off in a retreat setting, you can form the solid base for an excellent year of scouting.

Before you know it, fall recruitment will be here, and summer is the best time to start planning ahead for back to school nights. District Realignment


The Heart of America Council is committed to creating the best possible Scouting experience for our youth and volunteers. As part of the council's 2012-2016 strategic plan, a task force was assembled to review the alignment of our districts. The task force, made up of eleven council volunteers, was charged with determining if the council's current district alignment was providing the best service possible to our Scouts and leaders and to gauge our ability to effectively serve more youth within our communities.

After an extensive seven month review, the task force created a "draft" proposal of their findings. That proposal was presented to the Council Executive Committee on March 26, 2015 and it was approved. The final plan will be put before the Council Board of Directors for a vote this June. In advance of the June Board of Directors Meeting, the Council will be hosting a series of Fireside Chats throughout the Council. Fireside Chats are open to any district or unit volunteer and will serve as informational sessions as well as forums to allow volunteers to ask questions about the current proposal.

The image here shows the proposed boundries for the two new districts. They are broken down primarily along county lines, using school district boundries.



This proposal will have profound ramifications for the North Star District, and every volunteer in the District needs to take the time to understand what is being proposed and how it will affect them.

There are four Fireside Chats that the Council will hold to define and discuss this proposal, as well as give volunteers an opportunity to ask questions. One of these sessions is in our District at the KCMO Police Academy (the same location as Roundtable) on **Thursday, April 30th, at 7:00pm**. The other sessions can be found at the web site listed above.

This is important to the life of the North Star District. Every volunteer needs to understand what is being proposed, how it will affect them, and how it will affect how Scouting is delivered to the youth in the Platte and Clay county regions. Your involvement is important.

Frequently Asked Questions

Q: Will district names be changed? If so how will they be chosen?

A: The Johnson County Districts, North Star, and Thunderbird have significant changes to their boundaries and district names will be changed. In addition, new districts have been formed within Johnson county, as well as the splitting of Thunderbird and North Star Districts. New district committees will select new names and submit them to the VP of Operations for approval prior to August 30, 2015.

Q: What will happen with programs that are currently being planned for fall, including fall camporees, Cub Family Campouts, adult leader trainings, etc.?

A: All programs that are on the "legacy district" calendar for 2015 can still happen through the legacy districts. A review of the 2016 calendar needs to happen prior to September 30 so that updates to the 2016 calendar can be made and communicated to the units.

Q: How will this affect the 2015 Investment in Character Campaign?

A: The goal is to have 2015 IIC campaign wrapped up by the May 27 Victory Celebration, with all campaigns completed and no later than June 30. The campaigns will be complete prior to the implementation of the new Realignment Plan.

Q: How will 2016 goals Investment in Charter Goals be set?

A: Starting July 1, past prospects/donors will be moved into new the district structure and the history for new districts will be formed. Goals will be set off that history. The council strategic plan calls for 7% increase in IIC annually.

Q: How will 2015 popcorn sale be affected?

A: The 2015 popcorn sale will be supported by the "new" district structure and goals set accordingly based on history.

Q: How will redistricting affect 2015 Day Camp?

A: It will not. Most day camps happen in June, prior to the implementation of the Realighment Plan. For those districts whose day camp is in June, the "Legacy District" structure will still support day camp.


Q: How will this affect the 2015 and 2016 Budget?

A: 2015 events and activities will still be supported under the "Legacy District" budgets. The 2016 budgeting process will be supported by the new district structure.

Q: What will the 2016 District Dinners and District Award of Merits look like?

A: This will be the first "District Event" based on the new district structure. Each new district will hold its Annual Meeting in December/January to elect a new district committee. Those officers will be installed at the district dinner. Award of Merit Recipients will be voted on by the new district's advancement and recognition committee. 2015 JTE will be based on new district alignment adding in IIC results from Legacy District alignment (The Council will appropriately allocate IIC revenue at that time.)

Eagle Scout – UPDATE!!



Due to continuing issues with Units to having all the documentation required and signed when an Eagle Scout Board of Review is scheduled (which results in the BOR being postponed), the North Star District will start a new process starting May 1st.

All Scouts requesting an Eagle Scout BOR must return to a District Roundtable with all required documents

stated below in the checklist. NOTE: This checklist will be provided to the Life Scout at the time that their Eagle Scout Service Project is reviewed AND approved by a member of the North Star District Advancement Committee.

Once the Eagle Scout candidate has returned to Roundtable and presents all of the approvals and documents, then a BOR can be scheduled by Bill Moberly or John McBurney. This procedure brings the North Star District closer in line with most of the other Districts in the HOAC.

Steps required by the Scout after Project Proposal approval, before Board of Review:

- Final Plan must be completed prior to starting project. Provide a step-by-step description of how project will be completed based on the approved project. Eagle Scout Service Project Workbook No. 512-927 May 2014 or later must be used. Step by step to include:
 - a. Material Lists with costs.
 - b. Tools required and used.
 - c. Safety Issue.
 - d. Etc
- 2. Finance-How is project financed? A completed fundraising form if needed.
- 3. Review Final plan with Beneficiary before starting actual work.
- After project completion, complete Service Project Report.
 - a. How project was completed (in what order).
 - b. Any changes required from proposal and why.

- c. Before, during and after photographs of project.
- Final Proof of Completion (Signature of Beneficiary & Unit Leader).
- 6. Spreadsheet completed (other side) showing number of participants by category.
- Complete Eagle Scout Application and take to Council office for review and signature, Scout, Unit Leader and Committee Chair must sign prior to review by council office. (Normally a Unit Leader will Take to Council).
- Mail Reference letters (with return envelopes) addressed to Unit leader, Committee Chair, or Advancement Chair.
- 9. In preparation for board of review, prepare and attach to the Eagle Scout Rank Application a statement of your ambitions and life purpose and a listing of positions held in your religious institution, school, camp, community, or other organizations, during which you demonstrated leadership skills. Include honors and awards received during this service.
- 10. Return to roundtable for review of these items by District Advancement team. Once approved, the Scout can have his leader call Bill Moberly or John McBurney for a guest chairman so a Board of Review can be scheduled (phone numbers provided at time of approval).

Positions of Responsibility

The new Honor Guard patch is available for Boy Scouts. The new patch is to be worn on the right sleeve, not the left, because it, like the Musician patch, is not a "position patch." After clarifying that "serving in the Honor Guard doesn't count as a position of responsibility needed for advancement", one is left to ask, "What does count?"

The answer can be found in the Guide to Advancement, and Boy Scout Requirements book where it explains that for Boy Scout troops, the position of responsibility patches that may count toward rank and go on the left sleeve are "patrol leader, assistant senior patrol leader, senior patrol leader, Venture patrol leader, troop guide, Order of the Arrow troop representative, den chief, scribe, librarian, historian, quartermaster, bugler, junior assistant Scoutmaster, chaplain aide, instructor, troop webmaster, or Leave No Trace trainer." Note, however, that only those positions specified in the most recent edition of the *Boy Scout Requirements* book may count toward a Scout's Star, Life, and Eagle position of responsibility requirements.

Advancement is one of the eight Scouting methods used to help a youth develop and grow, and positions of responsibility are part of that process. Unit leaders should strive to align a Scout's strengths and skills with a position of responsibility that enables him to grow while serving the needs of his troop. A Scout's developmental needs will more likely be successful when he receives guidance, support, and coaching from his unit leaders in fulfilling these requirements (*Guide to Advancement*, topic 4.2.3.4.4).

For example, a 17-year old Eagle Scout candidate who is very active in sports, school, community, and church, may not need to be selected as the troop's senior patrol leader to develop his leadership skills. On the other hand, a 12-year old Scout may have very different needs and exhibit significant growth and responsible behavior by serving in a position everyone counts on such as troop librarian.

Furthermore, unit leaders do not have the authority to require Scouts to a hold specific position of responsibility to advance to a particular rank. For example, a Scout cannot be required to serve as senior patrol leader to obtain the Eagle Scout rank (*GTA*, 4.2.3.4.1). The senior patrol leader position is actually elected by all members of the troop, and each troop can determine its own schedule of elections for this position.

A Scout could hold a number of different positions to fulfill the position of responsibility requirement, as long as the total time adds up to the time required. Depending on the Scout's personal journey, these positions may not necessarily be consecutive (*GTA*, 4.2.3.4.2).

Speaking of reviews, remember that advancement is a tool used to help a boy grow, and thoughtfully assigned positions of responsibility can and will help the Scout to develop into the man we hope he will become. Now isn't that what we're all about?

SET Training Exercise – Oct 3rd

The North Star District will be participating in a Simulated Emergency Test (SET) training exercise on Saturday October 3, 2015.

A SET exercise involves the Amateur Radio Emergency Services (ARES), the National Traffic System (NTS), which is a messagehandling service of amateur

radio, the Radio Amateur Civil

Emergency Service (RACES) and others.

WØKON

It's primary purposes are to evaluate strengths and weaknesses of these and other groups in providing emergency communications, and to demonstrate amateur radio to the public.

In our area these SET's are conducted with the Kansas City Metropolitan Emergency Communications Council (MECC), the local Police and Sheriff's departments as well as coordination with other city, state and national authorities.

North Star is unique in that it is the only Boy Scout District in a MECC organization anywhere in the country. We are unique too in that we have an abundance of Amateur Radio operators willing to give another hour of their week to both Scouts and Ham Radio. This year, a part of the SET called an "inject" has been designed around a Scout activity. This does not require another camp out, or unit meeting, or even your units awareness unless you want it to. But it is a great time for an individual or your entire unit to earn the Emergency Preparedness merit badge, to teach your Cubs how to handle themselves in an emergency, or to show Crew members the importance of Emergency Preparedness in their day to day lives.

Keith Kaiser is spearheading this effort, and is in need of some volunteers for the following; merit badge counselors for both Radio and Emergency Preparedness, other Amateur Radio operators both adult and youth and any one else who would be interested in participating that weekend in the SET.

The longer term goal is to actually set up a Radio Scouting Committee made up entirely of Scouts and Scouters from the Heart of America Council. Just a quick reminder that the deadline is fast approaching for the Silver Beaver Award. All applications must be turned into the Council office no later than **July 1**st.


The Silver Beaver Award is the highest recognition the Heart of America Council can bestow upon an individual. The award is presented to registered volunteer


